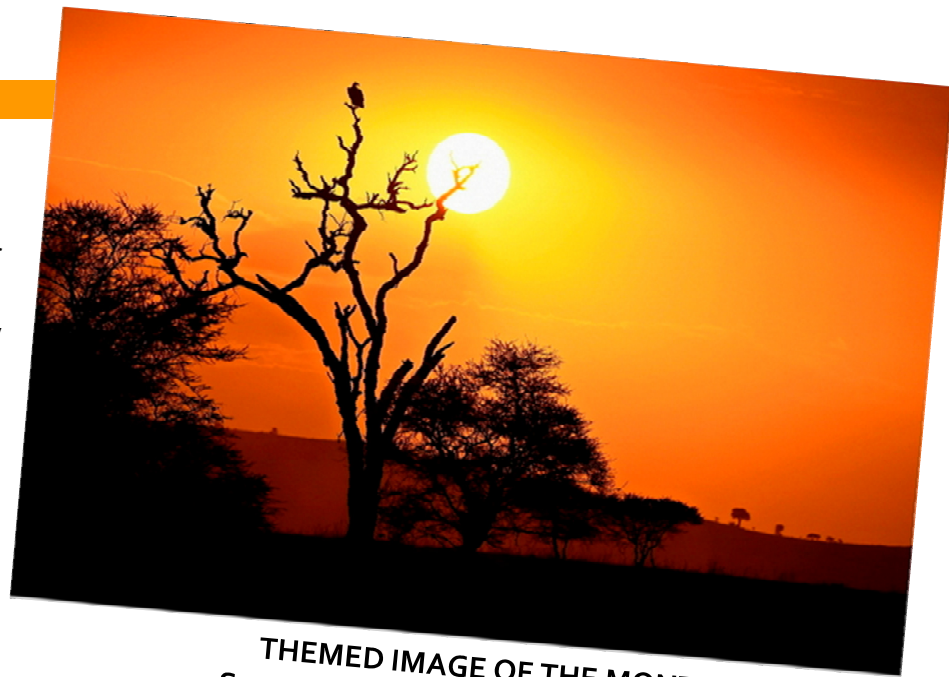

Tips for Shooting Birds in Flight

When you think about wildlife photography in Townsville, one species tends to come to most people's mind. Birds! With some great locations & a number of wetlands, bird photography is certainly a great hobby to get in to. As you start out with bird photography you quickly learn that one of the hardest aspects is capturing birds in flight. So today we are going to look at some handy tips on how you can get started.



Selecting the Right Location

Before you can attempt shooting birds in flight, you first need to find the birds. The best bet for a lot of species is finding a body of water. This time of year, there are a lot of seasonal wetlands that support an abundance of life, but the area with the most birds isn't necessarily the best.

There are a few additional things that you should be on the lookout for when hunting for a good spot.

1. What is your background going to look like? You need to be mindful of what is going on behind where you think the birds will be flying. Having a clean, contrasted background ensures that the birds are the main focus of the image; as well as makes it easier for your camera to lock on it's focus.

2. What is the lighting going to look like? The ideal time to shoot wildlife are during the golden hours (near sunrise and sunset) each day. When scoping out a desired location it is important to factor in where the sun is going to be at different times of the day. Are there big trees that are going to cut out the afternoon sun? Are you going to be shooting into, or away from the sun? etc.

3. Study your subject – No matter how much planning you do in regard to your background & lighting, if you haven't picked a location that birds come to, then you aren't going to get any shots! Take the time to go out to the location you are thinking of. Watch what the birds do, where they take off from, where they land. It doesn't

guarantee that they are going to do the same thing tomorrow, but over time you get a much better understanding of where they will be.

Getting the Right Equipment for the Job

Once you know the location that you want to shoot, now you have to make sure you are packing the right gear for the job.

The most important part is going to be the lens that you select. At a **minimum** you want a 300mm lens, but ideally you will want something more in the 500-600mm+ range. (full frame equivalent mm). Essentially the more zoom you can get, the easier your life becomes.

The second most important thing is your tripod or monopod. This one comes a bit more down to personal preference, but if you struggle to hold your big zoom lens then these are a must! There are a big range of options but for larger lenses you will want to pick yourself up a 'gimbal' head. These making tracking the birds as they move through the sky a whole lot easier.



Basic Settings

Depending on the time of day, how fast the bird travels, and a range of other variables, there is never a perfect exposure setting you can plug into your camera. Whenever I'm doing bird photography, I like to think of my settings in term of most important to least.

Firstly, you **must** have a fast shutter speed to get a sharp photo, therefore no matter what I never let the shutter speed go below 1/1000 for birds in flight. I will do whatever I need to with my aperture and ISO to ensure that can be achieved.

Second, when possible I want to have a wider depth of field to make it easier for my camera to focus. I tend to start with my aperture around f/8 and adjust from there depending on the lighting. Although a wider depth of field is nice, I don't want the image to become too grainy by pushing up the ISO.

Lastly, we consider the ISO. Generally I run my ISO in auto with a upper limit

that I am comfortable with the grain. This allows the camera some flexibility in helping you get your desired shutter speed & aperture, but prevents the ISO going too high and making it grainy. The actual value that you chose is going to come down to your specific camera & your level of tolerance, but on a full frame unit I tend to cap it between 6400-12800. There are a lot of great programs out there now days that can remove the majority of the ISO grain.

Ready to Photograph Birds in Flight

This article barely scratches the surface of everything there is to know, but it should arm you with enough to get out there and give it a crack. You can read all the photography articles in the world, but the best way to learn is to get out there and do it!
